

Summary of changes

Key changes:

- AS and A-level are linear assessments are in the year of certification.
- AS is a standalone qualification AS results do not count towards Alevel.
- Area of study Western classical tradition 1650–1910 is compulsory at all levels.
- There are minimum performance and composition times.

All regulatory documents for Music, the subject criteria from the DfE, assessment objectives and conditions for Music from Ofqual, can be found on their website. All awarding bodies must meet these criteria.

Component 1 – Appraising music

AS and A-level 40%

- A-level two and a half hour paper 120 marks

Areas of study (AoS) – All students must study Area of study 1, AS students choose one other from Areas of study 2-6, A-level students choose two others from Areas of study 2-7:

- Area of study 1 Western classical tradition 1650–1910 compulsory
- Area of study 2 Pop music
- Area of study 3 Music for media
- Area of study 4 Music for theatre
- Area of study 5 Jazz
- Area of study 6 Contemporary traditional music
- Area of study 7 Art music since 1910 (A-level only).

Set works strands – AS students choose one from Strand A or Strand B, A-level students choose two from Strand A, B or C:

A Baroque solo concerto

B The operas of Mozart

C Piano music of Chopin, Brahms and Grieg.

Three sections to paper:

- Section A Listening must answer two questions at AS and three questions at A-level
- Section B Analysis must answer one question at AS and two questions at A-level referencing set works

Two performances

- A-level: perform a minimum of ten minutes
- Must be taken between 1 March and 31 May in the year of certification

If the student's performance is less than the minimum time, it will not be accepted as assessment evidence.

Two hour and 15 minute paper 100 marks

Four Areas of study – students choose two:

- Area of study 1 Western classical tradition compulsory
- Area of study 3a English choral music in 20th century
- Area of study 3b Chamber music from Mendelssohn to Debussy
- Area of study 3c Four decades of jazz and blues 1910–1950.
